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
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

Monday


I always thought I wanted to be rich and famous, but now I'm starting to wonder if fame and fortune are worth all the hassle.

But there's only so much attention one person can take, and I bet that kind of thing would get kind of old after a while.


If you're famous, you can't just turn it off whenever it's inconvenient. And it wouldn't be much fun getting mobbed for autographs and selfies all the time.




When you're a celebrity, you can't even take care of your personal business without everyone finding out and posting about it on social media.




And when you're out in public, someone's bound to snap a picture of you when you're not looking your best.



On top of that, everyone feels like they have the right to know all the details about your personal relationships, which can't be a lot of fun, either.




Speaking of relationships, when you're a celebrity, you never know who you can TRUST. Because even the people closest to you will be happy to air your dirty laundry if the price is right.

And I'm sure it's no fun being someone who USED to be famous.




People recognize former child stars even after they've become adults. And I'd like to be able to enjoy a meal with my family in public without getting hassled by fans later on.




Don't get me wrong, it would be nice to have mansions and expensive cars and all the other stuff that comes with being famous. I just wouldn't want to deal with the downside of fame.

That's why it would be awesome to be FRIENDS with someone who's famous. Then you'd get all the perks of being a celebrity without any of the negatives.


Famous people are always traveling the world and going on fancy vacations. And I could definitely see myself getting used to that kind of lifestyle, especially if I wasn't the one paying.




Plus, if you're friends with someone who has more money than you, you can always count on them to pick up the tab.

But I just don't know how realistic it is to be successful when your band's name is Löded Diper.


Aside from their name, Löded Diper has a few obstacles standing in their way. The first one is that they still practice in our basement, even though my parents probably wish they DIDN'T.

Even with all that, Rodrick still thinks Löded Diper can make it to the big time. And he's come up with a plan for how they can do it.


There's a competition called the Battle of the Bands that's held every year, and Rodrick thinks if Löded Diper works hard to get ready, they can actually WIN it.


In fact, sometimes Bill still wears the T-shirt he got from that concert, even though he probably

Wednesday


Rodrick told his bandmates that one of the reasons Metallichihuahua got people to take them seriously early on was because whenever they were out in public, they looked like they were already famous.

He said the first step in making people think you're a rock star is to DRESS like one.






But it turned out that half the clothes Bill bought had been donated to the store by his gramma, so she made him turn right around and return them.







So she got them to lighten up a little. But I don't think the guys are gonna like the way those photos came out, either.




Eventually it got too cold out and the guys moved inside. Mom had other things to do, so I got put on photographer duty.

Rodrick wanted to get a few photos that would really tell people what Löded Diper is all about, which is how we ended up in the bathroom.






After that, the guys looked through all the photos, but they didn't think they looked professional enough.

But what Mackie forgot was that the photography place at the mall was a BABY studio.




I guess the studio isn't choosy about whose pictures they take, though, and they had the guys in front of the camera in no time.


The contest started on Friday night. I think the guys were planning on this thing lasting a few hours, and when it was over, they'd drive off in their new van. But that's not how it played out.

Mom was too busy to drive down to the dealership, so she sent me on my bike. And when I got there I handed the guys their food.





Another guy started reading the phone book from the beginning to annoy everyone else.


And I guess that was too much for Mackie, because he lost his nerve before the guy even got through




It was pretty clear that sleep deprivation was taking its toll on everyone. And one lady got eliminated for trying to pet a dog that wasn't


But the lady was watching some game show on her TV, and when she got a question right she lost her focus just long enough to get eliminated.



I thought that was the end of the contest, but it wasn't, because Bill and Rodrick got into an argument over which one of them should actually win the van.


Rodrick said it should be him, because all the band equipment was at his house. But Bill said it should be HIM, because he'd never had his own vehicle before.

Bill said he was OK with that, so they took their hands off the van at the same time and shook on it.






Tuesday

Those first posts didn't get many views, so they decided to change things up by filming in more interesting places. But those videos didn't take off, either.




Then, the other day, Bill dropped a speaker on his foot, and Mackie was filming when it happened.



They posted that video as a joke, and it was their most popular one yet.




Then they started posting a lot MORE stuff like that, and their channel REALLY took off.

Rodrick and the guys spent a lot of time talking about what they could do in their own music video to TOP Metallichihuahua.



Rodrick said it was time to do things the RIGHT way and record their music in a real studio. But just like everything else, those types of places cost a lot of money.



And he said if you DON'T have one of those stickers, teenagers won't buy it.



Then things got pretty heated between the two of them, and it took a long time for them to cool down after they were separated.





So then the guys took turns trying to get the pick back out. And I can't even tell you how much




Eventually, Drew managed to shake the pick free, but it went straight down Bill's THROAT.

Saturday



They didn't have any money to produce their own video, but what they DID have was a gift certificate that Mackie's little sister never ended up using.




But it turns out Shooting Stars Studio doesn't do videos for original songs.


They have a menu of songs you have to choose from. And I don't think the guys were all that thrilled with the selection.

And even though I doubt they'll ever show the video they made to anyone, it looked like they had a lot of fun doing it.




Wednesday


The guys were disappointed that they didn't get to make a music video they could use, but they realized that they still had a song, and there was a lot they could do with that.

Rodrick said the problem wasn't that their song was bad, it was that the people who choose what to put on the radio have terrible taste in music.


So he decided that if they wanted to get their music heard, they were just gonna have to get CREATIVE.

Rodrick said there are a LOT of places that play songs besides radio stations, so they made a list of everywhere they've ever heard music in public.


Gas Station


But that didn't get them anywhere, either.



After that, they started talking to people they actually KNEW. But nobody was willing to play their song.





And I guess he wasn't a fan of that kind of music, because he fired Drew's brother before his shift was even over.




The guys were pretty frustrated they couldn't get anyone to play their song, but then Bill said maybe they needed to take a different approach.


He said TV commercials usually have music in them, and maybe they could convince some company to use Löded Diper's music for one of their ads.

Tuesday



The other night they drove around playing their music from the roof of their ice cream truck.


But they didn't get past the elementary school, which recently installed speed bumps in the drop-




Rodrick said that if Löded Diper really wanted to make a splash, they were gonna have to start thinking a lot BIGGER.

The band got fined for disturbing the peace, and even spent the night in jail. Then they used their mug shots on the cover of their first album.



But Rodrick said that the minute they saw the police coming, they'd take off. And I guess Mackie wanted to be a team player, because he agreed to go along with it.


So this afternoon the guys packed up the ice cream truck with all their equipment and drove downtown.

The guys weren't ready to give up, though, so they parked in an alleyway and waited by a side door until someone came out. Then they started making their way up the stairwell with their equipment.


But that turned out to be a lot harder than they thought it would be.



Bill wanted to turn around and find a building that didn't have so many floors. But Rodrick said they were already committed and they just needed to keep going.



So Rodrick tried to get the lady who lived in the apartment one floor below to let them use her outlet.




The guys thought the lady was gonna call the cops, and they all got spooked. So they gathered up their gear and went back down the stairwell.

It should've been easier going down than coming up, but they were in a rush, so their getaway didn't go that smoothly.




As soon as the guys made it back out to the alley with all their gear, they started loading it into the ice cream truck.

But I guess she felt sorry for them because she let them off with just a warning.




And even though Löded Diper didn't get the publicity they were hoping for, they're already talking about using their run-in with the law for their first album cover.




Sunday

So they bought three dozen diapers and drove down to the city. But I guess the park has someone watching it twenty-four hours a day, and they got busted.




After that, none of the guys had the stomach for another big stunt.

So they decided to play it safe and just get some stickers made with the band's name on it.




Today the guys spread out and put the stickers up all over town. And they must've burned through half their supply in public bathrooms alone.


## JANUARY

I guess those stickers weren't a waste of money after all.


The club next door to Renegades is called the Headless Chicken, and the other day the owner reached out to Rodrick to invite the band downtown to talk about playing a show.

She said the Headless Chicken has live music every Thursday night, and if Löded Diper wanted to play there, she'd give them half of the admission she charged at the door.



Bill wanted to get one of those laser projectors to really put things over the top. But Drew's convinced those things are DANGEROUS, so they had to scrap that idea.




Rodrick wanted to make his drum set look extra cool for the show, so he came up with the idea of putting skulls on the tops of his cymbals.

Drew's uncle ran a construction site, and he was willing to sell the band a used porta-potty at half price. So the guys went to pick it up today.





Rodrick asked his friend Ward first, because he used to work security for the band at their shows. But Ward wasn't willing to help out unless they made him a full member of the band.






But I figure taking the job will make my Löded Diper tell-all book a lot more interesting. So really, I'm just in this for the DIRT.




It took over an hour to set up, and the guys wanted to squeeze in some rehearsal time before the crowd started arriving.



I didn't like the sound of that, but it turns out Rodrick couldn't pull this plan off WITHOUT me.



This whole thing seemed like a terrible idea to me, but I guess I felt a little responsible for leaving those drumsticks at home, so I went along with the plan.




Me and Bill walked past the security guard into the restaurant. But it felt like that guy knew we were up to something because he didn't take his eyes off us once we were inside.

Bill turned the flashlight on his phone on so we could see, and the robots were as still as statues in the dark.


I knew those things weren't actually ALIVE, but I definitely didn't feel comfortable being around them. So I wanted to hurry up and get this over with.




But it wasn't that easy. We tried to get the drumsticks out of the monkey's paws, but he had a death grip on those things.




And I don't know if the robots were motionactivated or WHAT, but when the monkey opened his eyes, it totally freaked me out.




I decided to bail on the mission, and I went out the back door. Bill was right behind me, but he didn't come out empty-handed.

When the light turned green, Rodrick hit the gas and left the security guard in our dust.







But when Drew disconnected the wires, the paw closed again. And this time it clamped shut on Mackie's LEG.




That's when the club owner came backstage and told the guys that if they didn't get out there and start playing, she'd never hire them to play at the Headless Chicken again.

The crowd seemed like they were in the mood to be entertained, but Löded Diper wasn't ready for their big moment.






And from all the squinting he was doing up there, I'm guessing he might be due for reading glasses.





But I was dealing with a BIGGER issue. People started lining up to use the porta-potty, and I couldn't do anything to STOP them.





Once everybody was gone, we started breaking down the set. But the lady who owned the place made us pick up all the chicken wings and clean the sauce off the stage, which added another




But the people who show up at these things really get into it, and I actually felt a little weird being one of the only people there not wearing some kind of costume.




Dad was a little disappointed that the main stars of his show weren't there, but he was still pretty happy to meet some of the second-tier actors.



I guess a lot of these actors make their living off events like this, so Dad shelled out a lot of money on autographed photos and memorabilia while we were there.






It must be hard to go from performing in front of thousands of people to sitting at a plastic folding table by yourself in a convention center. So the whole thing made me feel kind of SAD.

But Rodrick and the guys are totally fired up about this thing. Because the way they see it, they're finally gonna meet a real LEGEND. Saturday



Once they got inside, they went to look for Warwick's table, and they found him in the back.







That's when they started making bad business decisions and signed a bunch of endorsement deals just to make a quick buck.




He said they created a bunch of products they weren't really proud of, including a line of personal fragrances that ended up on the bargain shelf two weeks after it came out.



But Warwick said the worst decision they made was to create a Saturday morning cartoon show for little kids, because it turned off their older fans.







I'd never been to a bar mitzvah before, so I didn't know what to expect. But the food was great and the whole thing was a lot of FUN.





Each person got their own Nerf gun and a hundred suction-cup darts. And from that point on, it was just a free-for-all.




Everybody had a blast, and at the end of the party, the kid's parents paid the band in cash. And I got my 10%, just like Rodrick promised.

He said that when Metallichihuahua was starting out, they used to play shows seven nights a week, and they had a group of fans who followed them from place to place to see them perform.


Rodrick said Metallichihuahua's fans called themselves the Bone Brigade, and they dressed up in crazy outfits for shows.



Rodrick thinks that if Löded Diper wants to win the Battle of the Bands, they're gonna have to get crazy fans of their OWN.




He said that they could get one of those T-shirt guns and shoot diapers into the crowd at their shows.

The only downside is that the festival doesn't pay bands a lot to perform, so they have to make money in other ways.


And the way Löded Diper is planning on making money is by selling a lot of MERCHANDISE.



Bill thinks plush is too YOUNG, so he wants to make a comforter set for the older fans instead.




Rodrick said that when Metallichihuahua was at its peak, they had their own toothbrushes with bristles that were made from the band's actual hair.

The thing that got the guys the most excited was creating their own line of energy drinks. And they even came up with a name for their product.




Rodrick said maybe they could put a drop of sweat from each band member in every can.

The guys found a space for the truck next to the porta-potties, which wasn't the greatest place to sell merchandise.


And the only reason they sold anything at ALL was because people were desperate for toilet paper.



An hour before it was time for Löded Diper to perform, we unloaded all the equipment from the truck and hauled our gear to the main stage.



But we only had a few and never did manage to get our hands on one of those T-shirt guns.




Once the set was done, the guys wanted to just pack up and go home. But unfortunately, Mom signed up for the Full Diper, so we were stuck there for a while.



But Sebastian taught himself to drum with his FEET, so the band didn't even miss a show. And from then on he just kept doing it that way.



Bill said that maybe they could just wait for Sebastian to come outside the gate, and they could toss him inside the truck. But none of the guys were sure if that was actually LEGAL.




They couldn't agree on a plan, so they just agreed to wing it when they got there.

Saturday


I'm glad I trusted my instincts for once, because when Rodrick filled me in on everything that happened today, I was happy I didn't have to experience it firsthand.

Sebastian walked away, but Rodrick yelled and asked him to stop. Rodrick said they weren't there for autographs, and that they just wanted to TALK.


Sebastian must've been willing to hear what Rodrick had to say, because he stood there while he ate his burger.





Sebastian took a minute to finish his burger and fries, then he pressed a button and opened the gate. And none of them could believe what was happening.


They followed Sebastian onto the property, and even though the mansion was still pretty impressive, it looked like it had seen better days.

He said he'd be happy to talk as long as they cleaned the pool. So the guys got to work while Sebastian drank his soda on the diving board.





But Rodrick wasn't really interested in hearing this guy's sob story, so he tried to change the subject by asking him what advice he had for Löded Diper.





Mackie said if they wanted to be the biggest band of all time, they were gonna have to do something nobody's ever done before.


So Drew said maybe they could play a concert in outer space, which all the guys were pretty excited about, even though none of them seemed to have any idea how that would actually WORK.

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But Rodrick said Bill was thinking too SMALL. He said Löded Diper should have their own theme park, and the guys even sketched out a map of where everything would go.




Mackie said they'd make so much money from their theme park that they could afford to destroy their instruments at the end of every show, just like Metallichihuahua used to do.




Saturday

Ever since Löded Diper decided to stick together, they've been laser-focused on getting ready for the Battle of the Bands. But it turns out they've got a little COMPETITION.


There's a new band that's been putting their posters up all over town. And it looks like these guys have a lot in common with Löded Diper.




But what's REALLY annoying Rodrick is that it looks like Stank got themselves a sponsor, and one of their billboards is right above our highway exit.

one of their songs.




They've already got a huge social media following, and they've got an army of fans called "Stankers," who seem pretty passionate about the band.




The fans knew the words to all their songs, and Rodrick got mad when Bill joined in.

Saturday


Now that Rodrick knows who Löded Diper is up against in the Battle of the Bands, he's more focused than EVER.

He says if Löded Diper wants to beat a band like Stank, they're gonna have to OUTWORK them. So he's been holding practice twice a day, once in the morning and once at night.


But I think the new schedule is really taking a toll on Bill, who's been stealing quick naps during Mackie's guitar solos.




But Rodrick found out Bill was cheating on his new diet plan when he discovered a stack of empty donut boxes in the back of the ice cream truck.





It was raining that day and Bill didn't want to get wet by stepping out of the passenger door.


So he decided to crawl out of the truck through the pickup window. And that's where he came face-to-face with the assistant manager, Becky, for the first time.


She even took one of the songs that Rodrick wrote and marked up the lyrics.


Then Bill started writing his OWN songs. And most of them were ballads to his new girlfriend.

Bill wasn't finished, either. He said Becky's been telling him that since he's the lead singer, he's the face of the band. And she even created a new poster with Bill front and center.




But I guess that was too much for Rodrick to take. He said he was the one who started Löded Diper, and if anyone was gonna be the face of the band, it was gonna be HIM.


And I hope I never have to break up with anyone in person again, because I've gotta say, it's not a whole lot of FUN.



Monday


Things haven't been good with the band since Rodrick and Bill had their big blowup.

So now Bill's totally heartbroken, and he's been skipping practices.


And even when he DOES show up, he can't get through a song without breaking down in tears.

And from the first page, it looked pretty OFFICIAL.



The reason the lawyer sent the letter was because one of the Revolting Runts characters was called "Loaded Diaper," and apparently it was one of their most popular cards.




But none of the other guys had the stomach for an expensive legal fight, and they seemed happy to let Rodrick deal with this one on his OWN.



And from their flyers, it looks like they're willing to offer people a lot more than a few slices of pizza to come out and audition.




## APRIL

The only thing that DID surprise me was what they had to do to get their guy. Because from the look of their new poster, I'm guessing Bill and Becky came as a packaged deal.




Now that Bill is a member of Stank, Rodrick is even more obsessed with winning the competition.

The problem is, he still hasn't found anyone to take the place of his old band members. So he's moved on to plan B, which unfortunately involves ME.



Mom even bought us outfits for the show, which I guarantee none of us will be wearing.




So at this point I'm praying Rodrick comes up with a plan C and that I'm not a part of it.


Saturday





By then we were pulling up to the arena, and there was no turning back.




People were selling merchandise in the concourse, and Stank had a big table set up near the entrance. And somehow Becky had managed to get bobbleheads made in time for the event.



But Becky wasn't the only familiar face inside the arena. Warwick Sprinter had a table there, too, but it didn't seem like his stuff was selling.






We finally found our way backstage, which was a total ZOO. Most of the bands were already there, and the space was way too small for everyone.

But Löded Diper wasn't the only band that was performing at the end of the competition. Stank was scheduled to go on right BEFORE us.


That meant we had to hang out with Bill and his new bandmates backstage, which was really awkward. So when the competition started, I decided to slip out the side door and watch the show from the wings.

I thought they'd come out and tear into one of their big hits, because that would've definitely made the crowd go wild. But Bill came out by himself and sat down at a piano.


And when he started playing a slow song, the crowd didn't seem to know how to react.

The audience was totally eating it up, and I knew right then that Stank had this competition in the bag. And that was BEFORE Becky started tossing donuts into the audience.




I should've been a little more careful about how close I was to the crowd, though, because the next thing I knew I was PART of it.





Rodrick had plugged his music player into the sound system, and what was coming through the speakers was the version of "Diper Överlöde" the guys recorded in that studio back in December.


That meant me and Drew's brother were only PRETENDING to play, and Ward was just lipsynching to Bill's vocals.



And once Ward realized he didn't have to sing for REAL, he started to actually enjoy himself.




Nobody in the crowd seemed to notice that we were faking it, and I guess I started to have a little bit of fun, too.

Halfway through the song, Bill stopped singing and started COUGHING. And Ward didn't know what to do, so he just tried to keep up as best he could.




That's when I realized that Rodrick had accidentally played the first version of the song they recorded, right after Bill got a guitar pick stuck in his windpipe.

But it was too late to switch over to the GOOD version of the song. And when the sound of Bill drinking water came through the speakers, the crowd finally noticed something was off.




It seemed like a good time to get out of there. But we couldn't leave the stage because someone was standing in our WAY.

I just froze, because I didn't know if this guy was gonna arrest me or WHAT.



Metallichihuahua ripped through their greatest hits, and then they played an encore. And the only reason they didn't play a SECOND encore is because they had already smashed our instruments




Thursday
